Boulevard Blooms

Have you noticed the blooming boulevard of zinnias on the corner of Russell Ave S and Laurel Ave every summer? I caught up with Hugh Morris who carefully plans the garden each year. He first



got the idea in 2021 because he could not get perennials to grow on a snow emergency boulevard. Starting in the spring he makes a criss cross of trellis netting to support the plants after heavy rains and spreads about a pound and a quarter of seeds to cover the 1000 square foot area. He has added an irrigation system to water all the flowers. The flowers start to bloom around early to mid June. Hugh gifts the flowers to people through out the summer. He encourages all to cut what they need because it actually helps with propagation. He gets many nice comments from neighbors walking by. The gar-

comes new businesses and residents, here are a few parking reminders for our shared city streets. It's been a long time for most of us since we memorized these rules for a driver's exam!

- No parking within 5 feet of a driveway or alley entryway, measured from where the curb meets the driveway.
- No parking within 10 feet of a fire hydrant.
- No parking within 20 feet of a crosswalk or intersection unless there is a sign or parking meter.
- No parking within 30 feet of a stop sign or traffic light, unless there is a sign or parking meter.
- No vehicle may be parked over 72 hours. A vehicle missing vital parts will be towed.
- Vehicles must be parked within 12 inches of the curb and parked in the direction of traffic flow.
- No parking for vehicles over 10,000 pounds unless the vehicle is loading, unloading or providing a service.
- No commercial vehicle parking unless the vehicle is loading, unloading or providing a service.



pen Streets Minneapolis, the City's popular summer event series is hosting two events in September. Open Streets Minneapolis events transform the street for a day. Without cars, people can gather and celebrate the diversity and creativity of the city while walking, biking and rolling. West Broadway between Lyndale Avenue North and Penn Avenue North 11 a.m.-5 p.m. Saturday, Sept. 21 The West Broadway Business Coalition plans on more than 250 vendors and activities spread across 17 blocks. Live music, dance performances and cultural showcases will celebrate the rich diversity of north Minneapolis. Pop-up markets and a cultural food court will feature the heritage of the community through handmade crafts and culinary delights.

Remember to Call 311

very close call with a large vehicle on Penn Ave and Cedar Lake Road prompted me to be scared for my family's (and my neighbors') lives when crossing our intersections during busy times. My adrenaline-fueled fear turned to helpless frustration before arriving at a tenacious motivation to understand how we can tell the city of Minneapolis that some intersections are more dangerous than others (in the hopes of helping the city prioritize safety measures prior to harm occurring at a busy spot in our neighborhood).

If you are involved in an incident where a traffic violation or injury occurs, call 911 immediately. But if the incident was resolved in only close calls and potential danger, the right thing to do is call 311. I called 311 for the close call my family experienced. In the span of a few minutes, I spoke to a very helpful representative who collected my report, and submitted a case report to the Minneapolis Streets department under a "Traffic General Case with Callback". I anticipate a callback if further information is needed and to hear if there is any immediate action the city can take to

improve the safety of that location. Neighbors should call 311 to report close calls or dangerous interactions at intersections like Penn Ave and Cedar Lake Road to assist the city in collecting incident data.

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What happened to my Lilacs!

ike many of us, you may have been wondering what happened to your Lilacs this summer when the leaves turned dark brown and fell off. Take hope. The blight probably is not terminal.


It could have been caused by a bacterium (Pseudomonas syringae) which causes leaf darkening, leaf wilting and leaf dropping. This is largely a cosmetic condition. Unless it occurs for several years, it has little adverse effect. It is typically associated with wet conditions like those we had this summer. It is NOT a fungus, and fungicides are of no use. The blight can be transmitted from one season to the next via leaf debris. To prevent transmission it is essential to do fall cleanup.

A Cercospora or Septoria fungus could also be a cause of blight, but with different symptoms. The symptoms of this blight are small, brown to black spots surrounded by a yellow halo appearing on the lilac leaves. The leaves become distorted and drop prematurely.

Whichever blight your lilacs have, it should not be lethal. Do not feel that they must be dug up and discarded. They should recover, although their blooming may be delayed. Many lilacs have not had proper pruning for several years and would benefit from some rejuvenation pruning. This means removing dead wood and volunteer bushes. Cut off one-third of the large stems reducing the lilac bush by a third. This improves air movement and circulation throughout the lilac bush, reducing the spread of blight. Done every two years, it allows the smaller shoots to grow up, essentially creating a new lilac bush.

Thinking about what to do with your boulevard?

With the gas line upgrade and gas meter relocation process that has begun in Bryn Mawr, people are more focused on their streetside landscaping and are trying to prepare for some disruption to their "home turf". Those of us with boulevard gardens seem the most worried about what will happen to our yards. It seems an opportune time to talk about boulevard gardening and the city rules and common-sense practices that should be guiding all boulevard gardeners. Boulevards are, for some, the sunniest spots in their otherwise shady property. So, it is rational that planting sun-loving perennials, or even herbs and vegetables in this sunny location would be appealing. But there are many factors to consider before one rips up all their boulevard grass and begins planting coneflowers and tomatoes.

Boulevards are part of a homeowner's property. However, the city has what is known as an easement; a strip 14' deep in from the curb, in which they can dig for utility work if needed. They are not legally responsible for replacing any plants that might be affected by the utility work. So that is one of the risks one takes when boulevard gardening.

When I am asked by a friend or neighbor if they should get rid of their grass and instead plant a boulevard garden my advice is many times "No." This is because people frequently think a boulevard garden will be less work than mowing, which it is not, particularly in the establishment phase. Initially you need to remove all existing grass, a large task that needs to be done thoroughly unless you want to be pulling up grass remnants well into the future. And even before the grass removal, you need to call Gopher One to have them mark utilities. You don't want to inadvertently stab a shovel into a utility line.

There is a myriad of factors that go into achieving successful boulevard gardens. First off, there are the city rules, which mostly concern plant height. No plants should exceed 36" in height within a boulevard. The height restrictions near intersections and alleys and driveways are more restrictive. Plants cannot be taller than 18" within 40 feet of an intersection and within10' of an alley or driveway. These are rules meant to keep us all safe. They are to ensure sight lines are clear to ensure oncoming traffic and/or pedestrians are visible. It is the same reason one is not allowed to park too near stop signs. Accidents happen when you cannot

see people or approaching cars. Another design consideration is to accommodate cars parking next to a boulevard garden and the passengers exiting those cars. Ideally there is a 1-2' edge left at the curb that can be





walked upon. It could be made of brick, pavers, flagstone, mulch or low growing plants that can be walked upon. It also is wise to incorporate a walkway from curb to sidewalk to break up any long stretches of garden. With these pathways in place, your visitors will be happy, and you will not be cursing friends and neighbors who cannot help but tramp on your flower beds.

Resist the impulse to place any structures or anything difficult to move within the boulevard. No archways, containers or boulders. These cannot be easily moved and can cause problems with opening car doors, as well. Boulevard trees can present challenges, too. Tree roots will be established and need to be worked around when planting takes place. It behooves the gardener AND the tree to leave an area that is mulched but not planted at the base of the tree. Plants placed too close to the tree will compete with the tree for sun and moisture and may not thrive.

The soil level of a boulevard garden is a real concern. The soil needs to be at or below the sidewalk and curb level. A few inches below grade are ideal for the garden to accommodate a decent layer of mulch which can then stay in place and not wash away during rain events.

Creating a shallow depression within a boulevard turns it into a mini rain garden, trapping and filterup some floppy blossom with a stake, to have passers by compliment me on our boulevard plantings. Studies have shown boulevard gardens slow traffic.A good thing.

And I can attest that they encourage neighborhood friendliness.

ing excess rain. There should be no mounding of the soil within the boulevard. When soil is mounded, rain runs off quickly without benefitting the plantings, taking soil with it and ultimately doing harm to our storm sewer system and waterways.

City boulevards are a challenging place to garden. Many times, the soil is less than ideal. It may be compacted from foot traffic. It may get more salt than the rest of your yard. It likely has a very high snow load in the winter. It is exposed to more visitors than the rest of your property. You may have to stand in the street to do some weeding. But it can be a rewarding endeavor if you have the time, energy and commitment to take on additional gardening space.

I am always gratified as I am out weeding or deadheading or propping

MPS Places Tech Levy Question Before Voters on November Ballot

MINNEAPOLIS, MN – August 7, 2024 – The Minneapolis Public Schools (MPS) School Board approved a technology levy ballot question that will seek \$20 million in additional annual tech funding from Minneapolis taxpayers this fall.

If approved, the tech levy would not significantly increase the amount of money MPS spends on technology beyond typical staffing and other cost increases, or add new technology initiatives. Instead, it would minimize cuts to other MPS areas by allowing the general funds currently spent on technology to be used for other programs and services.

Like school districts across the state and country, MPS faces continued budget challenges despite tightening its budget and getting more revenue from the state. This is because of increased costs in areas like salaries and transportation, chronic underfunding of programs like special education and English learner services, and declining student enrollment.

"Raising revenue through this technology levy is just one way MPS is working to stabilize its financial situation and ensure a secure future for all students," said MPS Senior Finance Officer Ibrahima Diop. "If the levy increase is not approved, MPS will have to make further reductions to resources, programs and support which are critical for our students."

Election Day is Tuesday, Nov. 5, with early voting options available. Learn more about the technology levy on our website.Voters can check their registration status, register to vote, view a sample ballot and find their polling places on the Minnesota Secretary of State's website.

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
