Great ride to the Farmers Market. Looking at two grants; one to work with schools on safety and one for cross walk art projects. Made more crosswalk flags for Saturnalia.

## Racial Justice – Steve Harvey.

Preparing for purchasing trees this spring. Moving film to mid-January. Spring Sacred Sites tour. Exploring a river cruise tour with Dakota artist Marlena Miles. Steve Harvey visited the Robert J. Jones Urban Research and Outreach Engagement Center on Plymouth. Homewood Studios featured a Japanese artist over the holidays. Can visit Minnesota African American Heritage Center on Penn. Parks - Chris Etz/Barry Schade Walked trails with Elizabeth Shaffer at South Wirth. Map shared showing the condition of the trails. Wayfinding signs are going up. Loppet winter fest will be different this year, some new events, The Luminary Loppet will not be on race day. Elizabeth Shaffer is discussing what role the Park Board might play in the Wirth trails near Wirth on the Woods.

## Gardens - Drew Quirk

Completed downtown decorations, Karen Fredrickson designed Starry Night concept for planters. Received in-kind donations.

Finance/Membership – Jessica Wiley Karen Soderberg reported. Submitted the request for our city draw, accepted with no changes required. Will receive nearly \$24,000. Addie Arnold moved we approve the 2025 budget, Beth Franzen second. Motion passed. Karen Soderberg discussed liability insurance the city is offering, exploring applying for that. Question about ear-marking donations to specific committees. Discussed ideas for gathering feedback from neighbors about priorities.

Communications - Jay Peterson Working on new website with Nativ3. We have the license for Squarespace.

Community Projects - Jessica Wiley Lynda reported. Solicitation sent in December; two projects submitted. Will continue to solicit through February, identify funded projects in March.

Façade Grant – Addie Arnold Finalized the grant with Doug Anderson's property. Doug Anderson will be getting a check for a third of the costs of tuck pointing.

## **Discussion Items, New Business, Updates and Announcements**

Alyson Quinn discussed the meeting with Anthony Franz, Minneapolis city planner, concerning the possibility of the Vincent Ave right of way being vacated. No formal request to vacate has been submitted by the owner to date. Neighbors are welcome to submit comments or questions to Franz at any time. Pat Waddick discussed the land use map BMNA created in 2002 and the history of support for keeping this area accessible. Alyson Quinn and Pat Waddick suggested the BMNA write a letter of support for keeping the right of way. It was noted that the IRP (Issue Review Process form) would need to be completed before the Board could consider the request. Michael Scott raised issues from neighbors at The Theodore. Discussed problem with thermostats being locked in the building.

MnDOT's Rethinking I-94 Minneapolis - St. Paul Project is planning to remove the At-Grade/Boulevard alternative plan from consideration. 

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## From the Editor

y family typically makes a game of trying to watch all the Academy Award nominated films. before the Oscars. And while the tragic wildfires in California delayed the announcement of the nominees, they came out a week ago meaning only four weeks to see 50 films. So far, I have only seen six of them.

Saturday night, we were looking for a film that would not keep us up all night (both literally, due to being so long or so horrifying that we might never sleep again!) We landed on "A Real Pain". This 90-minute film is nominated for Original Screenplay (Jesse Eisenberg) and Best Actor (Kieran Culkin who recently won a Golden Globe for the same performance.)

The title of the movie held few secrets. Culkin's character is a real pain. He is also carrying around deep pain that is revealed as he and his cousin, embark on a Jewish heritage tour of Poland, which includes a stop at the Majdanek death camp.

So, while this was lighter fare than say, the Sci-Fi Horror film, "The Substance" (so I am told) it was definitely thought-provoking and the family dynamics, stressful (somewhat like Hulu's "The Bear").

With all this fresh in my mind, we saw the Broadway touring production of "Parade" at the Orpheum on Sunday night. Leo Frank, a Jewish man is accused of a terrible crime on the day of the Confederate Memorial Day Parade in the "Red Hills of Georgia" at the beginning of the 20th Century. What could go wrong?

What I found so terrifying about this truly wonderful musical, is the jubilant tribalism and the unity in their hatred, even though they know the testimony was false.

Both of these experiences fictionalized tellings rooted in truth. But they had me in a very reflective state of mind on Holocaust Remembrance Day on Monday.

In "real life" our country is embroiled in chaotic first week of a new presidency that seeks to question/reject all the norms of the past. Whether you think there is a benefit to this methodology or not, I hope we can agree that there is an unhealthy divisiveness at its root. The polarization implying that the only way forward is to take a side.

My hope is that in the coming days, months and years, we can learn from the past, stay focused on our goals and grounded in our love and respect for each other.

It enters through cracks and holes in the basement floor.

From Feb. 3-24, the City plans to accept grant applications to help pay for repairing failing private sewer pipes and connections to the public sewer. Homeowners can receive grants between \$5,000 to \$10,000 and may need a match to receive the funds. Funding will be awarded on a lottery-based system. This year's funding is expected to provide grants to 32-38 property owners. You can look at information


Sidewalks are an important part of Minneapolis' transportation system, and they should be open for everyone. That's why Minneapolis ordinance requires property owners to clear sidewalks within 24 hours after a snowfall for houses and duplexes and four daytime hours for all other properties. It's the law, and it's the neighborly thing to do. If your walk's not cleared, the City could have it cleared and you would be billed.

Don't forget your garbage, recycling and organics carts. Crews need a 36-inch-wide path from your carts to the street or alley.

# Parking Rules Refresher

s Bryn Mawr grows and welcomes new businesses and residents, here are a few parking reminders for our shared city streets. It's been a long time for most of us since we memorized these rules for a driver's exam!

- No parking within 5 feet of a driveway or alley entryway, measured from where the curb meets the driveway.
- No parking within 10 feet of a fire hydrant.
- No parking within 20 feet of a crosswalk or intersection unless there is a sign or parking meter.
- No parking within 30 feet of a stop sign or traffic light, unless there is a sign or parking meter.
- No vehicle may be parked over 72 hours. A vehicle missing vital parts will be towed.
- Vehicles must be parked within 12 inches of the curb and parked in the direction of traffic flow.
- No parking for vehicles over 10,000 pounds unless the vehicle is loading, unloading or providing a service.
- No commercial vehicle parking unless the vehicle is loading, unloading or providing a service.

## **Snow Emergency Parking Rules**



Parking rules last for three days after a snow emergency is declared:

## Day 1: 9 p.m. to 8 a.m

Do not park on either side of a snow emergency route until 8 a.m., or the street is fully plowed.

## Day 2: 8 a.m. to 8 p.m

Do not park on the even-numbered side of a non-snow emergency route from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m., or until that side of the street is fully plowed, or on either side of a parkway until 8 p.m., or the parkway is fully plowed.

## Day 3: 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Do not park on the odd-numbered side of a non-snow emergency route from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m., or until that side of the street is fully plowed.

## Racial Justice Committee Film Series

rello Bryn Mawr residents and readers of our fine newspaper Leverywhere. This is Stephen Harvey, board member and chair of the racial justice committee of the Bryn Mawr Neighborhood Association (BMNA). Last month we were lucky enough to screen the film, "Mankiller, The story of the life of Wilma Mankiller, who was the first woman to be elected Principal Chief of the Cherokee Nation" at the SRF auditorium. Ms. Mankiller, born in the Cherokee Nation in northeastern Oklahoma lead a most interesting life. I found her story to be quite extraordinary and inspiring. Almost sixty people joined us for the screening.

The BMNA has presented several films in the past and on those occasions, we were joined by either the film makers or representatives of organizations aligned with the film's topics. Thus, in the past were able to have question and answer sessions following the film. Sadly none of the filmmakers was unable to be present following this screening. But we were able to speak with Valerie Red-Horse Bohl, the film's director and producer. Mrs. Red-Horse Bohl is of Cherokee descent and is a filmmaker, investment banker and business owner. Among her other endeavors she is the founder, president, and principal owner of Red-Horse Native Productions, Inc., a company specializing in motion picture and television production and Native American herbal skincare and hair care products. Mrs. Red-Horse Bohl agreed to answer a few questions concerning the film.

#### 1) How did you determine how to balance focus for the film? Sexism, racism, national politics, local politics, sense of place, community building. So many themes.

When making a documentary film the director needs to determine the main theme of the film and then ensure all of the sections of the film tie into that theme. In this context we often have to edit out some interesting tidbits from our interviews. So, for this film, after conducting all the research, we felt the main theme was to focus on the building blocks of Wilma's life that contributed to and created the incredible leader that she was. So basically, all of the adversity she experienced and all of the negative events in her life, she had been able to turn into positive learning experiences. For example, her health issues, her family being shipped to California (this is a big example of where she really learned from the community about grassroots organizing), her tragic experience with the car accident and the sexist persecution all added to ber ability to lead as a knowledgeable and humble servant leader.

One interesting example of this plot point is that when interviewing one of the subjects about the relocation practices of Native American people, the woman we were interviewing is a Native American scholar and her research indicated to her that the people who created the reservation policies in the US as well as the relocation program that Wilma's family had been subjected to, studied some of the methodology from the Nazis in Germany during the Jewish Holocaust; these programs were based on those models. This is a horrific data point and one that is extremely interesting, but we felt that if we had included that in the film it would really take us into a "left turn" sidebar that had little to do with Wilma's actual leadership journey.

2) Wilma was such a visionary leader, with such formidable adversaries throughout her terms. In your interviews everyone seemed so respectful of Wilma's life and legacy with the nation. I'm curious whether her policies have been so overwhelmingly successful that her memory is universally respected, or whether naysayers still exist? Did you reach out to any detractors and if so, did they not want to speak on the record, or had they changed their opinion in hindsight? Or did you make a directorial choice not to focus on them in interviews, leaving the haters to the historical footage?

We definitely made the decision to try to talk to those that perhaps didn't support her politically when she was in office and to your first point it did seem that her leadership and her policies have been so successful most of the naysayers seem to have been converted and are now very supportive of ber. The most controversial section was obviously once she stepped down and the new tribal chairman was elected and there was all of the unrest with the charges of corruption and the violence when the tribal police were called in. What we determined was that Wilma was able to bring a thoughtful resolution by writing to other leaders throughout the country seeking help (we don't cover this in the film but in fact it was the Jimmy Carter Center who stepped up after she wrote to him and was able to mediate and bring about some sense of order). But the point was in interviewing people that had been involved in that situation, even though they admitted that it was a rough time in Cherokee History, it seemed as if everyone now supports Wilma and considers ber a very strong role model who was a very successful leader for the Cherokee Nation. We definitely interviewed people that we knew politically opposed her and yet they only had good things to say about her. There is one interview we kept in whereby a Cherokee man says that she is too much into Women's Lib - we thought that had a humorous bent to it - be was serious, but I think she viewed that as a compliment not a negative.

## 3) Have you followed the fortunes of the Cherokee nation post Ms. Mankiller' leadership? Considering your background in financial sectors, how would characterize economic development within the Cherokee nation?

The Cherokee Nation is considered one of our most successful tribes. They have, I believe, eight separate casino resort businesses as well as many other diversified industries. I believe they're the 2nd largest employer in the state of Oklahoma, only behind the government. Most people do feel that this somewhat modern turnaround of economic development was really based on Wilma's foundational policies put in place when she was in



office; especially the implementation of gaming which was a tough decision as we showed in the film. But in addition to gaming, she also really stressed Economic Development, education and health care which are all things that are needed to have a thriving community. The Cherokee Nation Industries as a whole have revenue in excess of a billion dollars annually and continue to grow and flourish.

4) What sort of projects are you working on now? I see that a focus in your work is to move beyond economic sustainability to regenerative practices. How do you see these practices functioning within tribal nations?

As a financial professional and investment banker I am focusing right now on working with tribes to finance and structure the lowest cost of capital for utility scale renewable energy

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projects. I do believe it is an exciting sector that can perhaps bypass gaming in terms of revenue for tribes but also is a positive impact business that belps create and generate renewable clean energy and reduce the carbon footprint. In terms of filmmaking, I am currently working on a documentary film called Stolen Sisters that focuses on the murdered and missing indigenous women and girls crisis; it's a very disturbing topic but one that needs to be elevated in the media. We are currently in pre-development and have made a short teaser. I would love to give you more information on that if anyone's interested in learning

# Want to meet your neighbors and get more civically engaged?

e are neighbors looking to join together to learn, listen, and take action at the most local level. We'd like to facilitate a community gathering program this spring. We envision something that mixes elements of a reading group, a salon, and a working committee.

## What might it look like? Here's a hypothetical version:

For three Thursday nights in a row, we'll meet for two hours to learn, discuss, and make plans for action on a particular, predetermined neighborhood topic/issue. Let's say our first topic is pedestrian safety.

On the first night we might... Spend a bit getting to know each other, and what brings us all into the space.

Discuss a reading that was assigned and provided in advance – or a reading provided on the spot that we spend our first ten minutes reading together. The material could be about recent research on pedestrian safety, or maybe about mobility in neighborhoods with elementary/middle schools.

Hear a short presentation from a neighbor, say a local city staffer or professor, with expertise or interest in the topic.

Ask questions, discuss our different visions and values for how it could feel to walk around our neighborhood, and come up with a few different ideas for taking action.

Determine and assign homework (on a voluntary basis, of course)

#### On the second night, we might revisit our ideas, discuss, and decide on a course of action.

Decide to focus on a creative approach to pedestrian safety issues: an initiative to create crosswalk art throughout Bryn Mawr. Come up with next steps we can take before our third and final meeting.

Determine and assign more homework, as needed!

On the final night, we will strive to agree on some kind of collective action to take. The action might be submitting a cowritten proposal to the BMNA for a new committee to move this work forward. It might be striking up a partnership with a local university to develop student-led art concepts for the neighborhood's consideration. The sky's the limit!

Our vision is that each meeting feels like a special place to be, for neighbors of all ages. We hope for participation from older adult neighbors to elementary-age children of Bryn Mawr. We envision short live music performances by neighbors, food and drink, and even possibly childcare.

#### Why now? Why local?

We want to meet and work together with our Bryn Mawr neighbors to collectively shape our community. This is hard work! There will certainly be many different visions for our neighborhood. But that is exactly what we want to get more practiced at: making space for sometimes tricky dialogues and negotiations in order to accomplish shared goals.

The process of determining our collective action will take the group through a journey of navigating local bureaucracies – that's part of the point of this whole idea. This work will be a critical lesson in identifying the levers we have accessible to us to get things done as a local community.

Who are we? Colleen and Ben (Area 6) moved to Bryn Mawr in 2020; prior to living here, we did creative community organizing work in Los Angeles, facilitating a salon series and creating community-building events that blended civic participation, food, and storytelling.

Bethanne (Area 5) opened Spruce in June 2020 with a mind to use the space for fostering community and supporting local artists. (There's a good story behind the collaboration with Colleen and Ben, you'll have to show up to hear it!)

If this sounds interesting to you, we invite you to shape this pilot program with us! We plan to present this idea at the BMNA meeting on February 12th – join in person or on Zoom if you're able!

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
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Sharing Tree

## **Bugle Notes**

#### Clarence John Shallbetter 1938 – 1924

larence was born in Minneapolis in 1938 and died in November of 2024. He attended St. Bridget's Catholic School, then De LaSalle High School, graduating in 1956. In his teen years he worked at his father's business, the historic Shallbetter Better Meats, on Lowry Avenue in north Minneapolis. He graduated with a Bachelor of Arts in Political Science from the University of Minnesota in 1960. He served in the Navy as a Lieutenant until 1967.

Clarence married Barbara Wojciak in 1969 and they lived on Penn Ave in Bryn Mawr with their two daughters, Sarah and Ann. Barbara died in 1978 and Clarence continued to raise his daughters in Bryn Mawr.

Clarence worked in public policy roles with the Citizen's League, the Minnesota House of Representatives, and the Metropolitan Council. He was also an ordained Deacon in the Catholic Church.

Clarence was an active participant in the BMNA. He was one of the founders in forming the Bryn Mawr Neighborhood Association (BMNA) in 1974 and served as the second President of the Board in 1975. He continued to participate in Board meetings and on committees for most of his life.

In the early days of the BMNA, Clarence was an advocate for the



neighborhood in the building of the I-394 freeway. He worked hard to represent neighbors in pushing for an exit at Penn Avenue and for soundwalls and for minimizing 394's effect on feeder streets. He was also a leading member on the committee that wrote the BMNA Comprehensive Plan for the neighborhood in 1997, which provided a twenty-fiveyear vision for Bryn Mawr. He was the lead writer for the traffic section of the report and fought hard to include views of traffic safety and calming. The plan provides a catalog of the main arteries through the neighborhood, issues faced with these arteries, and strategic steps to address the issues.

At the 2023 BMNA Annual Meeting, Clarence was recognized with a door prize for being one of the longest residents in attendance - 50+years! Clarence will be missed.

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
