Call to Order at 6:35PM

Agenda approved. Minutes from January 8, 2025. Amended to include John Trujillo as in attendance OL.Approved.

City of Minneapolis -Councilperson Katie Cashman

Cashman reiterated that she will not support vacating the right of way on Vincent Ave So. The owner has rights to her property and to explore development. Owner is currently conducting an environmental investigation using Braun Intertec Corporation. No land use application has been submitted to date. Owner has contacted the park board about possible land donation. Update on the boulevard gardening ordinance. The intention is to allow the public to use boulevards for planting, to create policies and language that will clearly spell out what is lawful. Technically boulevard gardening is currently not allowed. News reported by Fox 9 had inaccuracies; the city is not banning Little Free Libraries. Coffee with Katie will address this topic March 2. Grace Rude from the City's Homegrown Minneapolis program will discuss changes and answer questions. Question about who would monitor problem gardens. Ordinance will be voted on next month. Cashman pointed out that Coffee with Katie is a monthly opportunity for Ward 7 constituents to share ideas and concerns with her. It is not a political event. Read updates from Cashman at minneapolismn.gov/ward7

Presentation on new community gathering program -

Beth Turnbull, Colleen Pulawski, and Ben Gansky presented a proposal for a gathering series. Envisioning a reading group, salon, and working committee. Defined salon as an event where there is a specified topic or theme, specific people speak, then an open managed conversation ensues. Proposing seasonal groups gathering 3-4 times a year based on topics of shared interest, resulting in collective action. There is a link to a survey in the Bugle and the e-newsletter.

Crime Prevention Specialist Report – Email report from Shannon McDonough

Reported on the period from January 5-27. Two thefts, 2 burglaries. 2 vehicle thefts, (one was running). A robbery on Russell took place on the street. No one physically hurt. Facilitated request for letter of support for Market grant. Publicized blood drive, Racial Justice film, Community Projects, Market mural event, public safety meeting. Edited website. Met with Katie Cashman's office. Bryn Mawr Market had an open house for new mural. Market wants to continue to do neighborhood events. Welcome Packet pizza coupons were being photocopied. Taking steps to ensure coupons are original, they are only for new neighbors. Attended monthly meeting with Ward 7 coordinators facilitated by Katie Cashman's office. We have 1612 households on our mailing list. WinterFest sponsors have been contacted from last year, 7-8 sponsors so far, a dozen silent auction items. Barry Schade encouraged area reps to pick up and distribute Welcome Packets.

February 28 deadline for submitting projects for funding. Committee will meet in March.


Discussion Items, New Business, Updates & Announcements

The City of Minneapolis is seeking qualified applicants to serve on the Community Commission on Police Oversight. The independent body allows the public a forum to have meaningful engagement in police oversight and review. Members of the commission serve on the Police Conduct Review Panel as civilian panelists making recommendations about whether MPD policies and procedures have been violated and making recommendations about discipline.

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



I am not a fan of pre-made costumes. I prefer to alter thrifted clothing or create from scratch. I have been doing the later since I was 10 years old. I was a competitive figure skater and when our family welcomed kid number five. My mother informed me that it was time for me to start making my own competition and show costumes, so she signed me up for a sewing class at the YMCA.

Going into a fabric store is a tactile thrill that never gets old. I am working on two shows right now. In the past month, I have created three dresses, one king jacket and assorted other items. People who know me texted me when they heard the news that JoAnn Fabric & Crafts was closing all its stores.

For those who were reluctant to ask, I am positively unmoored. I have no idea what I am going to do for future projects. It takes all my selfcontrol to not rush to the store and buy everything on the shelves.

In good news, the Academy Awards are Sunday. All the kiddos are coming over for a watch party so of course that calls for a food theme. There will be pink bubbles with optional green elixir. 

Hello Bryn Mawr neighbors -

I'm Elizabeth Shaffer, your Minneapolis Parks District 4 Commissioner and now candidate for Minneapolis City Council in Ward 7. It is a tremendous honor to represent you on the Park Board. Your voice has been heard and represented over my last three years in the parks. We have seen success in each of the thirteen neighborhoods I represent and residents can attest to the work we have accomplished together. The City Council must make it convenient and attractive to do business in Minneapolis, and we must collectively support our community businesses and set them up for success. Minneapolis must also be a champion for workers. Strong wages, proper benefits, and safe, welcoming workplaces are essential to ensure everyone gets a fair shake.

To accomplish all this, we need level-headed leaders on the City Council who will work collaboratively in the best interest of residents. As we navigate federal uncertainties and a depreciating local commercial property tax base, we need to be intentional in our budget priorities, starting first with core city services.

Together, we can accomplish great things for Minneapolis. It's your city and I'm listening.

March 3, 1985

Blizzard with 17.6 inches of snow. Streets impassable, no buses. Couldn't get home from work, slept there.

March 13-14, 2025 Full moon, the Dakota Istawicayazan Wi or sore-eye moon. There will be a total lunar eclipse starting just after midnight on 3/13, with totality from 1:26-2:31am on 3/14. During totality, the moon will appear reddish. Sunlight includes many different wavelengths (colors) of light. During an eclipse, the longer red wavelengths make it through the edges of the earth's atmosphere more effectively than shorter blue wavelengths, which are more susceptible to scatter. It's the same reason the sky appears blue during the day but red during sunrise and sunset, or when there's smoke in the air.

March 15, 1997

Took an evening walk to the J.D. Rivers Garden area to see the Hale Bopp comet before it disappeared after entertaining us on clear nights for two months. Good view to the northwest over Wirth Park, relatively free of city light.

March 26, 1995

Ice out early on Wirth Lake.

Parking Rules Refresher

s Bryn Mawr grows and welcomes new businesses and residents, here Lare a few parking reminders for our shared city streets. It's been a long time for most of us since we memorized these rules for a driver's exam!

• No parking within 5 feet of a driveway

or alley entryway, measured from where the curb meets the driveway.

- No parking within 10 feet of a fire hydrant.
- No parking within 20 feet of a crosswalk or intersection unless there is a sign or parking meter.
- No parking within 30 feet of a stop sign or traffic light, unless there is a sign or parking meter.
- No vehicle may be parked over 72 hours. A vehicle missing vital parts will be towed.
- Vehicles must be parked within 12 inches of the curb and parked in the direction of traffic flow.
- No parking for vehicles over 10,000 pounds unless the vehicle is loading, unloading or providing a service.

Bulldozers in the Park: Redux

In mid-December of 2024, bulldozers tore through the northeast corner of Cedar Lake Park. The roaring, smashing, and grinding were deafening. It was also reminiscent of a similar occurrence in the park thirty years ago.

At that time, a makeshift prairie had sprung up from an abandoned rail yard north of Cedar Lake. Although it looked pretty, hordes of invasive exotics dominated the land, crowding out the native plants. In the early spring of 1995, bulldozers overturned and sculpted the land. Behind them came seed drills implanting native-specie grasses and forbs (herbaceous flowering plants) into the newly tilled soil. By the late spring of 1995, the landscape looked like the dark side of the moon. This writer was one of the those who had participated in the planning for the new prairie, but even I was aghast. Soon however, the forbs and grasses began to sprout up and by late summer, it was difficult to pick out any remnants of the bulldozers' work. Thirty years later, the Cedar Lake Park Prairie has become one of the jewels of the Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board's (MPRB) park system.

Abutting the prairie and spreading to the north edge of Cedar Lake lay a densely forested area. For decades bird lovers and others trod the paths through the thick underbrush. For them, it was secluded and cherished place with a thick undercover. Unfortunately, much of that cover consisted of generations of gnarled buckthorn growth. Although volunteers made sporadic efforts to curb its progress, buckthorn—like rust never sleeps. The tangled undergrowth strangled other trees and shrubs. In addition, some felt the lack of sightlines created an unsafe environment. For various reasons, the MPRB decided to act.

An unexpected windfall aided the park board's decision. When SWLRT

construction forced the closing of the Kenilworth Canal, MPRB sought redress. It received \$102,000 and decided to use this money exclusively at Cedar Lake.

MPRB asked some of the share-holders around Cedar Lake, including the Cedar Lake Park Association (CLPA), what might be the best use of monies. Many projects were promoted: funding improvements at East Cedar Lake (Hidden) Beach, management efforts in the prairie, funding projects connected to the School Forest, as well as buckthorn removal efforts all around the lake.

MPRB decided to focus on the northeast corner of Cedar Lake Park. (See map). It delineated the eighteenacre Mesic Forest section that went from the north end of 21st and Upton all the way around to the Mound area. MPRB recognized that there were many trees worth saving in the area. It was especially careful to mark out Maple/Basswood trees planted by the CLPA some years ago, as well as the Cedar Grove spiral that the group started in 1996. Luckily these trees were mature enough to be easily identified.

To oversee the project, MPRB contracted with Prairie Restoration Inc. (PRI). Its history with Cedar Lake Park goes back over thirty years. Indeed, PRI oversaw the first recontouring and seeding of the Cedar Lake Park Prairie back in 1995. Since then, it has provided plants and logistical support for several projects around Cedar Lake Park. It was uniquely qualified for the job.

Besides bulldozers, PRI brought in smaller grinders that could be used between stands of trees. It had to wait until the ground froze so as not to damage ground too much. But the area was large and replete with invasive undergrowth and the sounds of bulldozing and grinding echoed throughout the park. The work created huge swaths of open land and a thick blanket of woodchips that covered the ground. As the MPRB website nicely put it, "The project area may appear unsightly at times." Indeed.



Visiting the area just prior to the holidays, I was amazed at the difference. Sightlines have improved significantly—one can view the lake from the Cedar Grove, something that I've never experienced. The buckthorn has been eradicated—or so it seems. As most know, buckthorn is pernicious and sends out sappers under the ground that will resurface in time. That is why the project plan includes PRI revisiting the area for the next two years and continuing buckthorn eradication prior to planting native species trees and forbs in 2027. This is a long-term project and patience is needed. But it is fair to say that it will never be the same.

When I walked through the area, I talked to many people about their impressions. I asked one person about the improved sightlines, but they were dubious. They indicated that while there may be something to be said about seeing, there was something to be said about not being seen. Another person said they had a dog and felt protected and that they were disoriented by the destruction and unsure of the pathway, despite having walked there for years. Another person decried the loss of understory.

But the harshest criticism came in the form of an email sent to the park board (I was copied) from a long-time user of the park, one who lived along the Kenilworth Corridor. They had already seen an immense swath of destruction scar the land, not to mention the trail disruptions that have gone on now for six years. They criticized the lack of transparency. Although they lived in the area, they had received no word about what was about to happen to their haven. They thought MPRB could have advertised the project more fully, perhaps with an open house.

Change is hard. What one person sees as an opening of the land, another sees as a closing of their refuge. Some have argued that buckthorn serves a purpose, and that it is dangerous to create such a complete vacuum. Certainly, this brings up the issue of maintenance: the die is cast and the land is vulnerable to other invasives. The park board needs to continue to pursue a long-term plan beyond the project timeline. After the seeding of the land, it needs to manage it so that what develops will benefit the land...and the people who

Globetrotters Visit Bryn Mawr Tany of us "more seasoned"

Bryn Mawrtians remember watching the wildly entertaining antics and astounding basketball play of the Harlem Globetrotters on TV while growing up-guys with names like Meadowlark Lemon and Curly Neal. So it was with big smiles from staff and students alike, when two of today's Globetrotter stars introduced themselves and their oncourt antics at school on February 13th.

The Harlem Globetrotters exhibition basketball team formed in 1926 and traveled the world entertaining audiences with both on-court tomfoolery and amazing basketball shots and skills. Incredible athletes, in 1940 the Globetrotters won the World Basketball Championship and in 1948 and 1949, they surprised basketball fandom by defeating the world champion Minneapolis Lakers twice. Based in Harlem in the 1940s, the Globetrotters became the source of the best basketball talent in the country leading to the integration of the NBA when Sweetwater

(Nathaniel) Clifton became the first African American player to join the NBA. Over time, many more of the Harlem Globetrotters' most talented players such as Wilt Chamberlain were picked off by the NBA. The Globetrotters became an exhibition basketball club and tour the country as family entertainers, role models for youth and goodwill ambassadors.

(Brittany) Lister greeted students in






the gym where they demonstrated amazing basketball skills, modeled sportsmanship, and inspired kids to pursue their interests and goals.
